

Bloggging in a Dual Language Classroom

Student blogging is powerful! It's a fun way to give students the freedom to live as authentic writers... in any language. Teach/guide your students to engage themselves in learning, transform their learning environment, and blog about it.

Why Blog? Blogging has fundamentally changed how everyone in our world receives information. Student blogging is an easy way to bring authentic experiences, important for learning, into the classroom. It is also a great way to grow a strong learning community, both inside and outside the classroom.

Seven reasons why blogging can be powerful for student learning:

1. Students can practice 21st Century skills (communicate, collaborate, critical thinking, & creativity).
2. The environment allows for immersion into literacy... reading, writing, language, digital, etc.
3. Meaningful Experiences: • Student Voice • Student Guides • Student Mentors • Immediate Feedback
4. Powerful opportunity for authentic writing & authentic audience.
5. Working in digital spaces helps prepare students for future jobs.
6. Students become better writers. (The more you do anything, the better you get at it.)
7. Students can use it to reflect on what they are learning.

According to the **National Council for Teachers of English** Guidelines:

“Writing instruction must include ample in-class and out-of-class opportunities for writing, **including writing in digital spaces**, and should involve writing for a variety of purposes and audiences, including audiences beyond the classroom.”

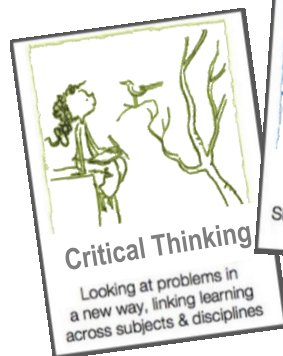
According to the **National Education Association**, skills that are most important to prepare 21st Century Students for a Global Society include:
